Congratulations on purchasing your Kramer VP-427X2 4K HDBT/HDMI Receiver/Scaler.

VP-427X2 is a high-performance auto-switcher/scaler receiver with 2 HDBaseT inputs and a local HDMI™ input for 4K HDMI™ over extended-reach HDBaseT. It supports automatic and manual glitch-free switching between the 3 inputs, and up- or down-scaling to any resolution up to 4K@60Hz (4:4:4). The output scaling automatically matches the resolution of the HDMI display on the output, or it can be manually set by the user. VP-427X2 enables extending video signals up to 180m over CAT copper cables at up to 4K@60Hz (4:2:0) 24bpp video resolution and provides even further reach for lower HD video resolutions.

VP-427X2 provides exceptional quality, advanced and user-friendly operation, and flexible connectivity and control.




Figure 1: VP-427X2 4K HDBT/HDMI Receiver/Scaler Front Panel




Figure 2: VP-427X2 4K HDBT/HDMI Receiver/Scaler Front Panel

Mounting VP-427X2

This section provides instructions for mounting **VP-427X2**. Before installing, verify that the environment is within the recommended range:



- Operation temperature 0° to 40°C (32 to 104°F).
- Storage temperature -40° to $+70^{\circ}$ C (-40 to $+158^{\circ}$ F).
- Humidity 10% to 90%, RHL non-condensing.



Caution:

• Mount VP-427X2 before connecting any cables or power.


- Ensure that the environment (e.g., maximum ambient temperature & air flow) is compatible for the device.
- · Avoid uneven mechanical loading.
- Appropriate consideration of equipment nameplate ratings should be used for avoiding overloading of the circuits.
- Reliable earthing of rack-mounted equipment should be maintained.
- Maximum mounting height for the device is 2 meters.

Mount VP-427X2 in a rack:

 Use the recommended rack adapter (see www.kramerav.com/product/VP-427X2).

Mount VP-427X2 on a surface using one of the following methods:

- Attach the rubber feet and place the unit on a flat surface.
- Fasten 2 brackets (included) on each side of the unit and attach them to a flat surface. For more information go to www.kramerav.com/downloads/VP-427X2.



Connecting VP-427X2

Always switch off the power to each device before connecting it to your **VP-427X2**. After connecting your **VP-427X2**, connect its power and then switch on the power to each device.





Figure 3: Connecting to the VP-427X2

To connect VP-427X2 as illustrated in the example in Figure 3:

- 1. Connect an HDBT transmitter (for example, Kramer **TP-780Txr**) to the INPUT HDBT 1 RJ-45 port (12) on the front panel. The transmitter is connected to a Blu-ray player.
- 2. Connect an HDBT transmitter (for example, Kramer **TP-780Txr**) to the INPUT HDBT 2 RJ-45 port (13) on the front panel. The transmitter is connected to a PC.
- 3. Connect an HDMI source (for example, Kramer VIA GO) to the HDMI INPUT connector (14).
- 4. Connect the HDMI OUT connector (18) to an HDMI Acceptor (for example, a display).
- 5. Connect the REMOTE pins (16) to contact closure switches (for example, an occupancy sensor). (See Connecting the Remote Control Switches on page 9).
- 6. Connect the AUDIO OUT 5-pin terminal block connector (17) to a balanced stereo audio acceptor (for example, Kramer **Tavor 5-O** active speakers).
- 7. Connect an IR sensor to the IR IN 3.5mm mini jack (4). In this example, point the Blu-ray remote controller to the sensor to control the Blu-ray that is connected to **TP-780Txr** via HDBT.
- 8. Connect a control system (for example, a laptop) to the ETHERNET RJ-45 port 10.
- 9. Connect a control system to the RS-232 3-pin terminal block connector 15. (See Connecting to VP-427X2 via RS-232 on page 8).
- 10. Connect the power adapter to **VP-427X2** and plug the adaptor to the mains electricity (not shown in Figure 3).

Connecting the Output to a Balanced/Unbalanced **Stereo Audio Acceptor**

The following are the pinouts for connecting the output to a balanced or unbalanced stereo audio acceptor:








Figure 4: Connecting to a Balanced Stereo Audio Figure 5: Connecting to an Unbalanced Stereo Audio Acceptor

Connecting to VP-427X2 via RS-232


You can connect to VP-427X2 via an RS-232 connection (15) using, for example, a PC.

VP-427X2 features an RS-232 3-pin terminal block connector allowing RS-232 control of VP-427X2.

Connect the RS-232 terminal block on the rear panel of VP-427X2 to a PC/controller, as follows:

From the RS-232 9-pin D-sub serial port connect:

- Pin 2 to the TX pin on the **VP-427X2** RS-232 terminal block
- Pin 3 to the RX pin on the **VP-427X2** RS-232 terminal block $9^{\circ}_{4}^{\circ}_{4}^{\circ}$
- Pin 5 to the G pin on the VP-427X2 RS-232 terminal block






Wiring RJ-45 Connectors


This section defines the TP pinout, using a straight pin-to-pin cable with RJ-45 connectors.



For HDBT cables, it is recommended that the cable ground shielding be connected/soldered to the connector shield.

Using Front Panel Buttons

Use VP-427X2 front panel buttons enable performing the following actions:

- Pressing the **INPUT** (2) to and cycling through the inputs to select an input.
- Using the MENU, ENTER (when in the OSD menu), + and buttons to control the device (see <u>Using the OSD Menu</u> on page <u>10</u>).
- Pressing **MENU** 6 and 8 to reset the resolution to 1080p.
- Pressing **ENTER** 7 and + 9 to reset the resolution to XGA.
- Pressing **FREEZE** (9) to freeze the image.

Connecting the Remote Control Switches

Control the display status via remote control switches.

Using the OSD Menu

VP-427X2 enables controlling and defining the device parameters via the OSD, using the front panel MENU buttons.

To enter and use the OSD menu buttons:

 - Arrow buttons to move through the OSD menu, which is displayed on the video output.
 - **EXIT** to exit the menu.



The default OSD timeout is set to 10 seconds.

Adjusting Image Parameters

VP-427X2 enables adjusting the image parameters such as contrast, brightness and so on.

To adjust the image parameters:

- 1. On the front panel press **MENU**. The menu appears.
- 2. Click **Picture** and define the image parameters according to the information in the following table:

Selecting an Input Signal

Select the VP-427X2 input source via the OSD menu.

To set the input source:

- 1. On the front panel press **MENU**. The menu appears.
- 2. Click Input and select the Source: HDBT 1 (default), HDBT 2, or HDMI.

An input signal is selected.

Setting Output Parameters

VP-427X2 enables setting output parameters such as the size of the image and output resolution via the OSD MENU buttons.

To set the output parameters:

- 1. On the front panel press **MENU**. The menu appears.
- 2. Click **Output** and define the output parameters according to the information in the following table:

Setting Audio Parameters

VP-427X2 enables defining the audio delay time and output volume.

To set the audio:

- 1. On the front panel press **MENU**. The menu appears.
- 2. Click **Audio** and define the following:
 - Set the audio delay time (lip sync) to off, 40ms (default),110ms or 150ms.
 - Set the AUDIO OUT output volume (default is 80 = 0dB).

Audio parameters are defined.

Setting OSD Parameters

VP-427X2 enables adjusting OSD parameters for your convenience via the OSD MENU buttons.

To set the OSD parameters:

- 1. On the front panel press **MENU**. The menu appears.
- 2. Click **OSD** and define the OSD parameters according to the information in the following table:

Managing EDID via OSD

VP-427X2 enables managing the EDID via the OSD MENU buttons.

Uploading the EDID

To upload EDID:

- 1. On the front panel press **MENU**. The menu appears.
- 2. Click **EDID Manage** and select the parameters according to the information in the following table:

The selected EDID is sent to the input.

Uploading EDID from an External File

To select the EDID from an external file:

- 1. Save an EDID file via the EDID webpage (see Managing EDID on page 31).
- 2. On the front panel press **MENU**. The OSD menu appears.
- 3. Click Advanced and select EDID Manage.
- Select an HDMI input and then select File.
 The external EDID file (as stored via the EDID embedded page) is stored.

An external EDID file is sent to a selected input.

Setting HDCP

VP-427X2 enables setting the HDCP on the inputs and on the output via the front panel MENU buttons.

To set the HDCP on the inputs and output:

- 1. On the front panel press **MENU**. The menu appears.
- 2. Click **Advanced** and define the HDCP parameters according to the information in the following table:

| Menu Item | Function |

HDCP is set on the input/output.

Setting Sleep Mode

Auto Sync Off turns off the output after a period of not detecting a valid video signal on the input(s) until a valid input is again detected or any keypad button is pressed.

VP-427X2 enables configuring the Auto Sync Off delay time when a connected display enters sleep mode.

To set Auto Sync Off:

- 1. On the front panel press **MENU**. The menu appears.




Figure 6: Local Area Connection Properties Window




Figure 7: Internet Protocol Version 4 Properties Window




Figure 8: Internet Protocol Version 6 Properties Window




Figure 9: Internet Protocol Properties Window




Figure 10: Controller Application Page with Navigation List on Left




Figure 12: Web Pages - Input Select Page




Figure 15: The Device Settings Page




Figure 20: The Output Settings Page




Figure 21: The HDCP Page




Figure 22: The EDID Page




Figure 23: Selecting the EDID and Inputs




Figure 25: The Audio Settings Page




Figure 26: The Advanced Page




Figure 27: Local Scaler Control




Figure 29: External Control




Figure 31: RS-232 Device Configuration Parameters




Figure 34: Local Ethernet Tunneling




Figure 35: RS-232 Page - Controlling an External Device via Local Ethernet Tunneling




Figure 36: External Device Control via HDBT Tunneling




Figure 38: VP-427X2 Control via HDBT Tunneling




Figure 40: Ethernet Tunneling via HDBT




Figure 41: RS-232 Page - Controlling an External Device




Figure 42: Authentication Page

USB Firmware Upgrade (USB Format FAT32)

To update the firmware via PROG USB port:

- 1. Save VP_427X2 bin. file (for example, VP_427X2_all_V*.bin) in USB flash driver and plug into PROG USB port.
- 2. Press and hold ENTER+DOWN button for about 3 seconds until the three HDBT1/HDBT2/HDMI INPUT LEDs are lit, and then release buttons. the device enters USB mode and firmware upgrade starts. Upon completion (after about 30 seconds), the device reboots.
- If the device is in USB mode but can't read the firmware file or if the USB flash driver is not connected, it reboots automatically after 10 seconds and exits the USB mode.
- If the power drops during firmware upgrade, it automatically starts upgrading once the power is back.

If the power drops in the early stages of firmware upgrade, you need to start firmware upgrade again.


